ROMAN STATES PROGRAM LAUNCHED FOR VPS

When the V.P.S. was first organized, we promised that one of the undertakings would be a complete and specialized coverage of the stamps and related material of the Roman States. After more than a year of searching we have finally located a person interested and informed enough to make a thorough and complete coverage of the Roman States.

We have chosen to form a committee to compile information on how to start a Roman States collection and carry it through to the advanced stages of Roman States philately, by means of a series of articles to appear in the Notes. The information at hand points to a top notch informative series of articles that should be of value to every member whether he is just considering the start of a collection or an advanced collector.

Needless to say, an authority on these issues to head such a program was needed. Such a person has been located, Louis Klein, of 526 Guarantee Trust Building, Atlantic City, New Jersey. Mr. Klein has joined the V.P.S. explicitly to start the ball rolling and will act as chairman of the Roman States Committee. His collection of Roman States material is unique and covers the rise and fall of the Roman States; has covers dating from 1458 to 1870 when the Roman States came to an end. The various types of mail carrying is also noted in this prized collection, such as courier, pony express, railroad, boat, regular delivery, etc. Another section of this large collection is devoted to documents and autographed letters of the various Popes and Cardinals.

Louis Klein has offered to translate any Roman States cover in French or Italian and examine them for members in addition to writing articles for the Notes. Some of our members have known Mr. Klein for some time and hold his opinion on Roman States material in high esteem. His knowledge of this chosen field has lead to a series of articles such as the "Ferrara Cross" and Cholera (Disinfection) covers of the Roman States.

In sending material to Mr. Klein for examination, members of V.P.S. should send remittance for return postage and insurance.

The time was January 7th, 1915, and the place was New Brunswick, N. J. I am the third child in a family of six and when my father was killed in 1920, it was quite rough sledging for all of us, especially Mom. I went to a country school and after the death of my father moved to the city. I went to New Brunswick High and graduated in 1932. I was a good student but excelled only in History. I created such a furor in High School that my younger brother when he entered new Brunswick High was warned by all the teachers not to try anything like "your brother did". Actually my teachers were wonderful and they did a great job. It was during my Junior High School years that I became interested in stamps, but soon thereafter I became interested in sports and I didn't really begin enjoying stamps again until 1950.

I got a job in Johnson and Johnson in 1933 and have been there ever since. I do clerical work which I like because of the many facets of the job. In 1942 I joined the U. S. Army thru the courtesy of Uncle Sam and served three and a half years, thirteen months of it being overseas. Visited New Guineas, Pearl Harbor, and the Gilbert and Ellice Islands which is so wide that you can run from one side to the other in thirty seconds. Actually, its just a long sand bar and water must be transported in. I don't think I'll ever have a train stamp from there!!!

My three sisters and brother have been married quite a while before I decided that two can live as cheaply as one. I married the former Miss Mary Munkacy on May 7, 1950. At the last minute I wanted to back out, but her seven brothers and her hundreds of friends surrounded the church and I was unable to leave. So here I am living happily ever after. To my lasting regret, I lost my very wonderful Mother last year. She lived long enough to see us all married.

My hobbies are stamps, reading, (Science fiction), and sports. In music I like operettas and Spike Jones records. (What -- no Liberace fan!) In stamps I have a U. S. album, Vatican City album, Hungarian album, Italian album, and I save trains, birds, and animals on stamps.

I have heard many stories and facts about Vatican City from our priest, Rev. Ernest Dunda, S.T.D., who is a good friend of Cardinal Mindszenty. Father Dunda has taught many years in Vatican City and knows Pope Pius very well."
